Dear Dr. Emmert:

My wife is a UofW graduate (I, fortunately have not been similarly afflicted with "Husky Fever"). We both read with dismay your decision to terminate Todd Turner as AD. As a former Ivy League football player, I am in a position to assess the demands placed on a varsity athlete, albeit my experience was not a fraction of what your players endure who also strives to succeed academically.

I was fortunate to play in a very different environment where athletics was second to academics. The Ivy League model has much to commend it, even if it does not generate Bowl income and Tyee Club loyalty. At heart, a university has to define its mission. My wife and I both view with skepticism any university that makes "Winning the only thing." Your ouster of Mr. Turner today smacks of that value set.

As a leader, it would be nice if you realized that you were hired to run a university and not a football factory. Perhaps your values are better suited to LSU.
